The 2013 Rhododendron Festival will have many returning artists from our past festivals as well as new presenters. Cloud

His drawing of the Mentone Inn, the Wedding Chapel and the Mentone Springs Hotel are favorites among local art collectors. Local author Greg Starnes will be selling his just published collection of ghost stories: "Hollers from the Hollows" which highlights stories from our area. It is a thriller, and


AND MUSICIANS

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



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Coming To Mentone

My mother first brought me to Mentone in the late 1940s, before I was born. Really. Laying there in the warmth of my womb/room, having fetal thoughts, putting on baby fat and preparing for my coming out party, I thought, "Hey! This Mentone place is okeedokee in the extreme. Think I'll live here someday." So now I do.

Just kidding about the fetal memories. The truth is I really don't remember exactly when it occurred to me that when one eventually reaches a certain age, one can decide for oneself where one will live. But it did, and here I am. The route here was long and the sideshows were many, but here I am!

Growing up in Gadsden and later Auburndale, Massachusetts, my thoughts were never far from Lookout Mountain. I believe that even from my earliest days as a full time fetus I must have begrudged every moment I spent somewhere other than my beloved Mentone. A few years before I was born my grandfather Charles Shepard and four other Gadsden businessmen had purchased the property at Mentone's Moon Lake from the estate of Martha Berry, the legendary educator from Rome, Georgia. My little brother Shep and I spent whole summers at the lake as we were growing up. I remember eating Eskimo pies at Bailey's Grocery, and drinking the once-a-day permitted coca cola as we built our tree fort in the woods. I remember jumping off the impossibly high, not to mention impossibly rickety, diving platform

at DeSoto Falls. And eating peanut butter and banana sandwiches on float trips on the river. Tom and Huck: eat your hearts out.

While the wage earning men in the family would commute down to Gadsden to work, we'd stay here, day after idyllic day, fishing, swimming in both the lake and the Little River, playing with Max and Roberta Cash's kids, and later Dwight and Nelson Stallings, and doing all the little boy things that little boys do. The good news is that no one was killed or badly injured. That is, if you don't include the broken arms, various contusions, or the nail I stepped on that was removed by old Dr. Quimby down in Valley Head. Down through the years there were Big Chill weekends too numerous to mention, honeymoons too numerous to forget, and even the conceiving of my son, all in Mentone. Then, finally, mercifully, after 17 years as the executive vice president of the Alabama Academy of Family Physicians, I finally gave up the flatlands forever and moved here 5 years ago. This is

Out of mercy for you, gentle reader, I will forgo the usual prattling on about the gorgeous scenery, mild winters, temperate summers, magnificent and abundant wildflowers, blah, blah blah that are the acknowledged attractions of the Mentone area. We all know them well.

Let me just say instead that I firmly believe I have rhododendron and mountain laurel pollen (acquired as a nature loving fetus) coursing through my circulatory system in such abundance that Mentone is part of me down to the molecular level.

Over my lifetime I have lived in more than a dozen towns and cities and in almost 40 different houses. I've been married an astounding number of times. I earned two college degrees, raised or helped raise 4 kids, worked for half a dozen companies and organizations, broke an arm another couple of times, and traveled to 10 or 12 foreign countries. But during all that coming and going, there has been one constant in my life: Mentone.

It's time for me to absquatulate for now, but when it is eventually time for me to punch my time card for the last time, just cremate me and sprinkle what's left on the waters of Moon Lake. I want to end up where I started.

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
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To Know Silence

"I have known the silence of the stars and of the sea, And the silence of the city when it pauses, And the silence of a man and a maid, And the silence for which music alone finds the word, And the silence of the woods before the winds of spring begin..."

This is the beginning of a poem by Edgar Lee Masters, the poet best known for "Spoon River Anthology." It's a long poem, seventy lines, and is the one I chose to memorize as part of an eleventh grade English class assignment. All of my classmates selected poems of four to fourteen lines, but I was so moved by Masters' poem that I had to learn it, to contain it in my mind. I'll never forget the ease of memorizing it, or the lack of nervousness when presenting it. I was sixteen years old and had already learned the importance of silence, the need for it in my life.

When I speak of "silence," I realize that I am thinking primarily of the absence of spoken language, of words that convey emotions or ideas, of words we share with each other as we speak and tell our stories. But there is more to silence than the absence of spoken words. It goes to the heart of things, to the deepest core of our being. In silence we learn who we are. Another line in Masters' poem says "and I ask, for the depths, of what use is language?"

Some of my deepest joys have come in moments of absolute quiet. As a young teen, I would spend long summer afternoons reading on the big porch that surrounded my house. Daddy and I would often sit together on the porch, and he'd tell stories; or we'd talk together but as often as not, we'd just sit together in quiet stillness. In the cooler evenings, I'd sit alone with the music of Brahms and a stack of science fiction books, in a dark room lit by a single lamp.

As an adult it became harder to find quiet times. College was demanding, not only academically, but also in the personal swirl



of new relationships and campus activities. When I attended the University of South Carolina in Columbia, one of my fears was that as a dorm resident I'd be unable to find the stillness my spirit needed. But my roommate, a perky nursing student, had a boyfriend in her hometown, and every single weekend she was off for two days. I had the room to myself and loved the quiet Sundays when I'd read the paper, walk to a nearby art gallery for an afternoon concert, or just sit by the duck pond and scatter crumbs to the fat fowl.

Hardest of all was marriage, when suddenly someone was there ALL the time. And as a new instructor at LSU in Baton Rouge, I had so much work it was almost impossible to find time

for stillness. I'd set the alarm for 4 AM, not to get up and grade papers, but to sit by the window, write in my journal, watch the sun rise, listen to the sounds of birds waking to the day.

Over the years I've had a number of friends for whom silence was the worst thing in the world. Some would fill the spaces with long

monologues or pepper me with questions, thus avoiding the dreaded empty spaces in conversation. Once someone asked me how I could just SIT, unmoving, quiet, not even reading. There's no real answer for that, but I know that there are classes now that try to teach people how to do just that. I think it's in the silences between people that friendship really begins. Sure, we love to ask questions and talk about feelings and ideas and possibilities, but for me the best moments in friendships have been times of just sitting together, sharing the quiet, feeling no need to talk. Some of the sweetest times I've shared with my husband Wayne are moments of absolute quiet - sitting on our porch, watching sunlight change the patterns of light and shadow in the woods, or walking together on a beach while waiting for sunset or

I know that for me (and I think this is true for many people) it is in silence that I can hear the voice of God. In stillness I "hear" my heartbeat and the passage of breath in and out of my lungs. Then other sounds emerge: a breeze stirs the leaves of the trees, goldfinches call to each other, a train whistles in the valley, a dog barks. All of these things create the fabric of quiet in which Spirit dwells. And I feel such gratitude that no language can speak.

Spring has Sprung! And I, for one, love Mentone in May! Birds are singing, sun is shining, flowers are blooming and gardens are being planted! We all know that it is almost time for our famous Rhododendron Festival! Mentone simply glows in May! And speaking of gardens, if you are wondering what to plant, here is a short list of perfect May, direct sow vegetable seeds. Bush and pole beans are great, and if you use a continual 7-10 day sowing method, you will have a long lasting supply of beans coming up in increments instead of rows and rows all at once! Beets, carrots, corn, cucumbers, peppers, squash, tomatoes and melons are also ready to be sown! Cabbage is perfect too, just remember to fertilize and water them when heads begin to form! And if that's

not enough, herbs like Basil, Thyme, Oregano, Sage and Dill are ready for planting too! We do a "family garden" at my parents house. Everyone chips in on planting and gathering. Sage Advice - Growing Sweet Taters

I've been gardening organically in Shinbone Valley (that's on the east side of Lookout Mountain, about 12 miles from Mentone) for about 19 years now. It's a passion born in me I think and nurtured by my parents, my Mother loving flowers and my Dad good, homegrown, Southern vegetables. Daddy grew most of our food every summer as well as about an acre of golden nugget sweet potatoes that he sold for extra mad money to local grocery stores and anyone lucky enough to put their order in early. He first came upon the golden nuggets at

Bonnie's Plant Farm near Eufaula, AL, around 1970. In 1994, Daddy overnighted a package of "slips" to me and every year since I have saved seed potatoes and grown the golden nuggets here in Shinbone Valley. I will bed my seed taters on 4/14 and look for the "slips" to poke through the earth about 2 weeks after that. Then, when the slips are about 4 – 6 inches tall, I'll pull them off the seed potatoes, hoping to get at least a couple of small roots with each slip and set them out in a row about 16 inches apart. Towards the end of October, I'll dig the

hills of golden nuggets, let them cure in boxes for around three weeks, then bake the first pan of them and enjoy along with pinkeye purple hull peas, collard greens, homemade pickled beets and cornbread from fresh ground corn. It really doesn't get any better than that for a fall meal. And the next morning, slice a baked sweet potato crosswise, brown on both sides in an iron skillet and serve with over light yard eggs and cornbread toast topped with homemade blueberry jam. Simply delicious.







When We Were Wee

Thave always said we should talk to our elders before it's too late. I had the honor to sit down with a long-ago Mentone resident, Mrs. Bama Culberson. I sat down with Bama at her 90th birthday party. I sat and listened to an amazing story of life and times at Mentone during the great depression. I was totally in awe of this great lady at how well she remembered her life story. I only hope that I do justice in the telling.

Bama Culberson was born Bama Brooks in Pleasant Grove on Sand Mountain in 1923. Her grandfather had brought his family by wagon from Oklahoma after the flu of the 1800's had taken most of his family. Bama's father was in diapers when they made the move. Mr. Brooks worked in a cotton mill in Gadsden and her Daddy farmed when he was older. Her mother loved Sand Mountain and wanted to stay, but during the depression there was no fertilizer and you could not grow crops without it. Mr. Brooks had a brother that was a preacher in Mentone and preached and prayed with folks in exchange for eggs, chickens and vegetables. Mr. Brooks was told to come to Mentone and cut and sell wood, that the people here had money. He loaded his family with his two cows. two horses and wagon and came to Mentone with no money and no way to survive. Bama was eight years old when she made the trip. They moved in a squatter shack owned by a mister Jones that was located where the old town dump off Cove Road used to be. Her

father soon found out that there was no money here for wood cutting, and one of his two horses had already broken a leg and had to be destroyed. Her mother thought if she could make a garden, maybe the children could peddle vegetables and keep from starving. Bama remembers her mother putting fresh vegetables in syrup buckets and sending her and her sister out to sell what they could. She recalls her first sale was to a lady with a newborn child. She sold her carrots to cook for her child and collected ten cents. That child was John Jones whom we all still know today.

Here the Brooks were at Mentone living in a shack with four children with no job, no food, and selling a little produce when the children could do so. It came time to go to school and the four children walked from the shack to Moon Lake, and not wanting to go they hid in the bushes outside the school until the teachers had to go retrieve them. She remembers starting in the third grade and her teacher was Mr. Hicks. He asked the class to learn a poem, and she refused and was kept after class until he finally gave up and let her go home. Times were tough in those days. She remembers the speech that then President Roosevelt gave about good things to come and a chicken in every pot. Her Dad thought maybe they could get some food and possibly another horse to replace the one that had broken a leg.

Bama says her family moved nine times in nine years and struggled until commodities came about. They were so glad to get goverment food even if it was old and outdated. She remembers the first meat they received. It was a ham but when they cut it, they found it was petrified to the bone and had to be thrown out. They did however receive oatmeal, brown sugar and cocoa which their mother fixed three times a day and sometimes if they had flour would make chocolate pies.

As years passed, more children were born until there was a total of eight (five boys and three girls). In those days there were no doctors or medicine and when sickness struck, more often than not, children and adults died from things like pneumonia and sometimes a crippling disease called polio. Her Dad and one brother caught pnuemonia and were dying until a neighbor lady doctored them with homemade cherry wine.

By this time Bama had lived all around Mentone but life was still very hard. When she was fifteen, her family moved to a big two story house that belonged to Kelly O'Rear. John O'Rear still lives on the same property. Her dad took a job working on building the road from Cloudland to Chattanooga. Bama recalls that was the first time she had ever seen a loaf of bread. Her Dad bought one and made sandwiches--she was fifteen. At this time there was a bus that ran to take them to school; there were then five in school. She still recalls the kindness of Sammy and Clara Cash and how they were always such good neighbors.

Another set of neighbors just down the road were the Culbersons who had a son named Benton. When Bama was seventeen she was walking to Bankhead church at night and Benton would walk her there and back because of darkness. They started dating and after nine months were married. She was eighteen and he was thirty two and a bachelor. Benton always followed construction and kept good jobs. In those days he was working building war plants. Bama recalls that all the workers slept in their cars on the jobsite. Bama and Benton found a one room place to rent for fifty dollars a month which was very high but they had to pay it. They went from that war plant to St. Paul Minnesota to another war plant. Benton belonged to a union and followed the work, which took him back to Birmingham, Alabama, to help build the airport.

Bama was pregnant with her first son, Lawrence, and stayed at Mentone with Mrs. Culberson. When Bama went into labor, she recalls going outside and yelling across the hollow for Clara Cash to come and take her to the hospital which was in Gadsden at that time. Clara came and drove her there. After the baby


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Rhododendron Garden Club

Upon opening it, I found that some of the books had molded. I carefully cleaned them hoping that I wouldn't inhale the spores of mold and mildew.

I found the date that the Rhododendron Garden Club was started but no more information. Years ago, all of the records for the club were accidentally destroyed. We do not have records before the 1980's. I remember that some of the members at that time remembered some of the dates and names of charter members. I will look for this information later.

By the time the outside workers came in for lunch, I had five scrapbooks and various other memorabilia for them to look at if they wanted to. I shaped some photos to put in books later and packed everything back into the box. One of the members has a lot of recent photos and when she gets these to me I will make a new scrapbook of the last few years. I also need to find the last articles of the meetings in The Groundhog that are preserved in a book. Maybe I can find them and bring that up to date.

All in all, it was a very good day and much was accomplished, which can always be said for this club.

On June 11, 2013 there will be a Flower Show at the M.E.R.F. Community House in Mentone. This will give club members a chance

The Hunting Horn By Linda Brown

There it came from no one seems to **V** know. John and Mary Baty were doing some work on their bookcase and there it was. As soon as John looked at it he knew who it belonged to. But how did it get to his house? It was a hunting horn made from the horn of a cow. These are hollow and you drill a hole to put your mouth over; and, if everything works as it should, you can blow through this hole and the horn emits a sound to call your Fox Hounds

or whatever dogs you hunt with. John is a fox hunter because; "Once a fox hunter, always a fox hunter."

This particular horn had initials carved on the side, and John knew that they were the initials of the fox hunters in the family of Paul Purvis. All of them were dated, starting back in the 1700's, and John knew that the next one should be Paul's initials. John called me because the Purvis family had lived in the Mentone United Methodist parsonage at one time. He thought I might know where they were. I did not know but I knew of some people in Mentone write a more complete history of the hunting who might. I talked to two or three of them and they told me some others to contact. We got the word out and a friend of a friend contacted Greg Purvis in Florida. In Greg's words, "When I saw that someone in Mentone was looking for us to return a hunting horn, the hair stood up on my

arms, and I felt the presence of my dad."

You see, Paul passed in April last year. Now it was Greg's turn to have his initials engraved along with his dad's information. Greg has moved in with his mom, Gail; and when he told her, she had the same feeling. They both have said by e-mail that this has brought a lot of comfort to them. John and Mary have shipped the horn and it arrived intact. Just imagine the feeling that Greg and Gail had when they held the horn which was held by their dad and husband and in Greg's case by many of his ancestors.

John has left it up to me and the family to horn and hopefully we can gather enough of the history (especially the story of how it got left in Mentone) to write another story of the Hunting Horn. Let us know if you can add any information.

Seeking Quality of Life

We bought a century old farmhouse on the old Summerville Road in 2007, and we moved away from southwest Alabama where our family lineage goes back over 160 years. I watched him carefully for any sign of displeasure or disappointment in my choice, but to my joy, he indicated his approval by characteristically raising his eye brows as he looked around which was a positive sign of satisfaction in the place.

The old farmhouse structure was modernized over the last century, but it was originally a two story dog trot house with an open corridor hallway that lead from the front porch to the back porch. Of course, at some point the open corridor was enclosed to form a formal entry and living room. The stone foundation came from an old school building in the area.

Doug and I restored two historic properties, an 1864 Victorian home and an 1898 commercial building that once served as an Opera House on the second floor. This experience will come in handy as we go about restoring our new old home in Mentone.





was born, you had to be taken home in an ambulance; but since there was not one in Ft. Payne she came home in a hearse belonging to Mr. Hoyt Wilson of Wilson Funeral home. She brought Lawrence home to Mentone where there was no power so even his bottles had to be warmed by a lamp.

Bama would give birth to three more children, and one morning after breakfast Benton walked outside and fell dead with a heart attack. Bama had no way of supporting the kids at home. While Benton was alive, for five years she had done housekeeping for the Lewises who lived down the brow. When her daughter, Melba, was born Mr. Lewis asked her to bring Melba with her every day. He had never been around a child. Mr. Lewis was one of the people who built the Hoover Dam.

After the Lewises, Bama worked in a lunch room and then took a job at the Men's Den in Fort Payne selling clothes; and with the help of Bentons social security they survived. Bama worked at the Men's Den for fifteen years or until she was about seventy years old. She then went to work for the council on ageing. The office, at that time, paired socks for a company in Ft. Payne. There were fifteen ladies that worked doing the pairing. She then went to the sock museum and stayed for another two years.

Well, Bama there you go. I hope I have done justice to a great lady in telling her trials during and after the great depression. If I have made any errors in the telling, I want to apologize in advance. Bama also shared memories of times like Benton taking her and her sister to see the old Hitching Post dance hall in Mentone, but in those days if you were married you could not dance in public. Wow, how times have changed. I really didnt know how I was going to tell her story, but now I think it was one of the most enjoyable things I have done in a long time.

Bama's daughter Melba has been a lifelong friend, and I want to thank her for the help in getting this story told. When you think your day is going bad think of what our forefathers went through just to survive-- and your day won't seem so bad.
